# From the Mayor

Dear Neighbors,

Thank you for your patience with our road damage. The recent rains have done serious damage to both Amsterdam Road and Montague Road. Potholes and more washout damage exist on several of our streets. Large repairs require a contractor and heavy equipment to be properly and safely reconstructed. We have organized this and are waiting on the availability of the contractor for work to begin.

Keep in mind that all local cities are in similar distress and there are limited companies that do the work. Work on our streets will begin very soon. Our public works department will be working on manageable damage sites. We have inventoried the repair sites, but if you see one, report it, just in case we missed it. Again, thank you for your patience. Please know that we are working on it.

We have planned for mill and overlay projects on other streets, but this work is delayed due to the June rains and overbooked contractors.

#### **Amsterdam Valley**

The Park Pointe project developer, Condoview LLC, is currently working on approvals and is close to beginning utility work on Amsterdam Road. Work on in the detention area is scheduled to

start first. As a result, northbound Amsterdam Road, from the roundabout to Montague Road, is permanently closed to through traffic. Residents can continue to use all other open sections of Amsterdam Road during construction.

Due to all the rain, southbound Amsterdam Road reconstruction is delayed. I will share updates when work is scheduled to begin.

#### **Audubon Forest**

New homes along Wald Court are under construction. Trucks have a certain access route: Amsterdam Road to Park Drive to Audubon Road. Landscaping at the street entrance is also delayed because of the rainy month of June, but plantings have been ordered and landscape work will begin soon.

### St. Joseph Lane Sidewalk

This project has been delayed, pending work on the grant to proceed. We were hoping to get it done fall of 2019, but it looks like it will be done in the spring of 2020. Some things do not move as quickly as I would like them to.

Have a great rest of your summer and watch for updates for construction progress on the city website.

# **Building Permits, Animal Tags, Vehicle Decals & Taxes**

### **Building Permits**

If you're planning home improvements, remember to contact Planning & Development Services of Kenton County (PDSKC) before you begin your project. PDSKC issues permits for the City of Park Hills. Call them at (859) 331-8980 or visit their website at www.pdskc.org to find information about fees, what projects require permits, and how to request permits. Note that the Park Hills Police Department can issue a stop work order until proper permits are filed for any project. As you embark on your project, consider how it affects the direction of water flow or creates other new conditions for your neighbors. Also remember to keep your grass cut and weeds under control, even while your project is underway.

### **Animal Tags**

All dogs and cats must be registered with the City of Park Hills by September 30, 2019. The cost is \$5.00 per pet, per year and there is a limit of five pets per household. Also remember to be courteous to your neighbors by keeping pets in their own yard and any dog barking to a minimum. Please obey the leash law and clean up after pets during walks.

#### **Vehicle Decals**

The City of Park Hills is once again selling vehicle decals. If you live in Park Hills, you're required to have a decal for each of your vehicles, even if you:

- Park in your own driveway or garage.
- Have out of state license plates.
- Drive a vehicle that belongs to your employer.
- Drive a motorcycle or scooter.

Purchase a removable decal for each of your vehicles by September 30, 2019, for \$15 each, at the city building located at 1106 Amsterdam Road. Funds from the sale of vehicle decals go to the repair and upkeep of city streets.

If you're paying by mail, please include your vehicle's year, make, model, and license plate number along with a self-addressed stamped envelope so the city clerk can return your decal by mail.

As of October 1, 2019, a \$20 late fee will be added to the cost of each decal. The Park Hills Police Department can also issue citations to residents who do not register their cars. The citation fine for not displaying your vehicle decal is \$25.00.





### **Important Tax Information**

The City of Park Hills is sending out 2019 property tax bills at the end of August—these bills are due during the month of September and become delinquent on October 1, 2019. Tax bill payments are the responsibility of property and homeowners, and will only be sent to mortgage companies if requested.

If you do not receive a tax bill by September 1, please call the city clerk's office at (859) 431-6252. A penalty and interest fee are immediately added to all delinquent tax bills on October 1, with no exceptions. Payments postmarked September 30, 2019 will be accepted.

### **Pay Your Property Taxes Online**

Visit the city website, parkhillsky.net, to pay your taxes. Payments are processed through Municipay which requires a convenience fee that is disclosed before payment. Payments may also be made by electronic check with a flat rate of \$1.50 (last published rate). All major credit cards are accepted online and in the clerk's office.

### **Property Tax Exemptions and Changes**

Property owners 65 years of age, or older, are entitled to a homestead exemption for property taxes. The exemption amount for 2019 and 2020 is \$39,300 which is subtracted from the assessed valuation before taxes are calculated. It reduces the amount you pay for city and county taxes. You must live at the address in order to qualify for the exemption. In addition, the law grants this exemption to disabled persons, regardless of age, if the disability meets certain state requirements. For more information, please call the Kenton County Property Valuation (PVA) office at (859) 392-1750 or visit kcor.org to apply.

Should you need to remove a deceased person's name from a property tax bill, the following criteria must be met:

- The survivor's name must appear on the deed as an owner and state right of survivorship.
- A copy of the death certificate must be provided.

With this information, the name may be removed from the tax bill only. A new deed must be filed to remove a name from a deed. For more information, please contact the Kenton County clerk's office at (859) 392-1650.

Note that the city clerk is not able to make property tax bill adjustments based on exemptions or changes. These changes are handled by the PVA.

### Park Hills Fire Department News

Greetings to all! Now that summer is well underway, we want to share that your local Park Hills Fire Department (PHFD) has been quite busy conducting a variety of annual duties and outdoor activities. The PHFD is currently training five new volunteer members of the department on equipment orientation and the basics of firefighting. These new members all come from the surrounding area and range from fully trained to brand new. All of the current members have been participating in this training and assisting with the newer members. You may also have noticed PHFD vehicles frequently traveling the city streets as classes in driver training, traffic management, and preplanning have all been taking place.

The daytime staff has been busy tracking new developments and conducting annual fire safety inspections of all multi-family dwellings and businesses within the city. During the inspection process, the top five most common violations we've found are as follows:

- Missing or inoperable smoke detectors
- Expired or broken fire extinguishers
- Combustibles too close to heating or electric
- Electrical issues with outlets, cords, and power strips
- Blocked exits or aisles

These violations are easily repaired and require minimal effort to keep properties safe for tenants and customers. While the PHFD does not typically inspect single-family or two-family homes, we are always available to answer questions or offer safety advice. We encourage residents to practice home fire safety and take an active role in helping keep our community safe by doing things like:

- Displaying your house number, so it can be easily seen from the street.
- · Keeping fire hydrants free of obstructions and readily visible.

Simple steps like these can help us locate you quickly and make our job much easier.

Our service in Park Hills also extends beyond fire and EMS emergencies. Recently, during the periods of heavy rain, PHFD crews responded to assist residents who experienced flooding in their basements. Since the role of the PHFD can be limited in flood situations, should the conditions arise again, we recommend that you:

- Use extreme caution when entering a flooded area with any electricity present.
- Keep all storm drains cleared of debris and other items.
- Notify PHFD immediately if you detect any gas odor.
- Keep all floor drains clear and unobstructed.

### Rake It or Leaf It

It's almost that time of year again! The leaves will begin to fall soon, and we want you to be prepared with an easy and environmentally-friendly way to dispose of your yard waste.

The public works department has a leaf



vacuum that attaches to the city's truck so you can schedule your leaf pickups when you rake. The cost is \$35 for one collection, \$70 for the season, per address. To take advantage of this service:

- Bring a check, cash, or money order to the City Clerk's offi during regular office hours.
- Mail your payment to City of Park Hills, 1106 Amsterdam Road, Park Hills, KY 41011.

• List the date you want us to pick up your leaves with your payment—give us at least three days advance notice.

Prepare for your leaf pickup by raking your leaves into a pile at the curb, not into the street. Leaves in the gutter can clog our sewer systems and flood our basements! The drier the leaves, the better—try to schedule your pick up when it's not raining.

Also, if you have other yard waste, public works can help! Call or email the city clerk to learn more.

# Planning and Development Services and the eTRAKiT System

Have you heard of Planning and Development Services of Kenton County? You might hear their name abbreviated to their common acronym, PDS. PDS oversees all kinds of important city planning processes and resources, like:

- Building code administration reviewing construction plans, issuing permits, and inspecting new construction to make sure it meets minimum standards.
- Geographic Information Systems (GIS)—developing and providing access to digital data, maps, and online mapping tools like linkgis.org.
- Infrastructure engineering—reviewing construction plans and plats to make sure minimum standards are met, and inspecting construction to make sure projects are completed properly.
- Planning and zoning administration—reviewing permits, handling issues and violations, reviewing zoning text and map amendments, and answering requests for zoning information.



PDS is the planning and development resource for all of the cities in Kenton County, and it's also the one-stop-shop for all Kenton County residents like you to go to when you have zoning questions, need building permits, or want to report issues. There's even a handy online portal called eTRAKiT: etrakit.pdskc.org

Through this portal, you can request maps, do property searches, report issues like unsightly properties or junk cars, view current projects, track open cases, and more. If you have an

issue to report, you can select from a dropdown list of issues, attach photos, and share your address or remain anonymous. You can also call PDS at (859) 331-8980 if you want to speak to someone rather than file your report online.


### Remembering the Gourmet Strip

This article originally appeared in The Encyclopedia of Northern Kentucky by editors Paul A. Tenkotte and Dr. James C. Claypool, published by The University Press of Kentucky in 2009.

Gourmet Strip. This was the name given to a string of restaurants, nightclubs, and taverns stretching along the Dixie Highway (U.S. 25/42), from Covington to Florence, Ky. The strip was a popular destination for Cincinnatians, Northern Kentuckians, and travelers, particularly from the 1930s through the 1970s. Dining varied from fine cuisine to tavern food to the new fast food drive-ins of the 1940s and 1950s. A number of entertainment spots featured illegal gambling, such as bookmaking, slot machines and gaming tables. The end of gambling in Kenton County in the 1950s, the opening of I-75 in 1963—diverting interstate travelers—and various fires brought an end to the "Gourmet Strip," and only a few buildings remain. Some of the prominent restaurants included these in Park Hills:

- Hahn Hotel (1424 Dixie Highway), a nineteenth-century inn and tavern where drovers of livestock stopped.
- Marshall's (1450 Dixie Highway), which featured a dining room, cocktail lounge and party rooms.
- Colonial Bake Shop (1470 Dixie Highway), open 24 hours daily, offering coffee and baked goods to travelers.
- Lamplighters Club of Nick Behle (1491 Dixie Highway), a late night gathering spot principally for musicians and workers from the restaurants and clubs along the strip.
- White Horse Tavern (1501 Dixie Highway), opened in 1936 and operated by Ben S. Castleman; destroyed by fire on January 26, 1972. Castleman reopened the restaurant across the street in the old Golden Goose, closing it in September 1972. In 1977, he and other investors opened a new White Horse at 3041 Dixie Hwy. in Edgewood, but it closed in 1978.
- Gus Sanzere's Golden Goose (1504 Dixie Highway), originally known for its Italian food and now the home of the Szechuan Gardens.

- Chappie's Tavern (1560 Dixie Highway), opened in 1936 as the Blue Star Tavern, operated by the Wooten family, and now the home of Chuck McHale's The Gardens of Park Hills.
- Old Mill Grill on the northeast corner of Dixie and St. James Ave., built for the tourist trade about 1930 or before, with distinctive roadside architecture featuring an operating windmill. Gasoline pumps stood outside, and there was also a restaurant offering chicken and steak dinners.

### 2019 Kenton County Pioneer Award

Dr. Jim Claypool was awarded the prestigious Kenton County Pioneer Award for 2019 by the Kenton County fiscal court. To date, there have been nine people awarded this distinction. This award is given for distinguished service to the county, the state, and the nation.

Per the Kenton County website:

Dr. Claypool is best known for starting the Northern Kentucky University (NKU) Athletic Program. He serves in a leadership capacity in numerous initiatives, including the University Honors Committee at NKU, NKU Athletics Committee, Kentucky Historical Society and the Kentucky Historic Preservation Committee.

He hosted 163 half-hour interview programs, *Northern Lights and Conversations*, for NKU's cable channel, five segments

of Bywords for Kentucky Educational Television (KET), and was featured on KET's hit show *Where the River Bends* (2008), a 2-hour documentary about Northern Kentucky. In 2001, he was featured as a commentator on ESPN Classic's national and international broadcast of the career of jockey Steve Cauthen.

He has authored or coauthored several books, including *The Tradition Continues: The Story of Old Latonia, and Turfway Racecourses* (1998) and *The Encyclopedia of Northern Kentucky* (2009), to name a few. Two current projects include *For the Love of the Game*, a Steve Cauthen autobiography, and *The History of Park Hills, Kentucky*.

Jim and his wife Sharon have been residents of Park Hills since 1999, and three years ago he served as Grand Marshal of the Park Hills Memorial Day parade. He also serves as a founder and a current member of the Park Hills Historic Preservation Committee.

# History of Park Hills Book In Progress

Our very own, Dr. Jim Claypool is the author of the future History of Park Hills, Kentucky book that will focus on the heritage and homes of our great city. Here is a sneak peek at an excerpt that is in progress for the book.

#### 1114 Park Drive

This charming Dutch colonial, the current home of Fred and Susan Brunner, has an interesting history. The home was built by the Brown Family and was featured in the original Park Hills marketing brochure. Martin Brown was the Kenton County



Attorney. The home is perched on the side of what was then known as the Lake of Park Hills—now Miller's Pond.



In approximately 1931, the home was purchased by Edwin and Linnoir Connor Bischoff. The Bischoff family owned Rose Creamery, a successful dairy that was prospering despite the grueling economic times. Linnoir was quite elegant and artistic. She made numerous additions to the home to accommodate her family of four children: Nancy, Joan, Tommy, and Myra.

Modifications to the home included enclosing the porch and extending a full porch across the front, expansion of the kitchen to meet her needs, and a playhouse that was a miniature version of the main house. Linnoir entertained frequently and was an accomplished hostess. Her daughters attended Villa Madonna Academy and her son attended a military school in Indiana. Edwin's sister, Elenor Tabeling, also moved to Park Hills and purchased a home at 1032 Lawton Road. Linnoir's brother, Elmer, also moved his family to 711 St. Joseph Lane. In the early 1950s, Edwin sold Rose Creamery to Dean Foods. He used some of the profits of the transaction to buy a large farm in Richwood, Kentucky. The farm had a beautiful Victorian home which Linnoir populated with antiques. Ed became involved in breeding horses and the family came to spend more and more time in Richwood. Their daughter Myra was a talented rider and would even "break" horses. Interestingly, Myra's son, Steve Cauthen, became a stellar jockey and the youngest jockey to win the Triple Crown while riding Affirmed in 1978.

Eventually, the lovely Park Drive residence was sold to the O'Hara family who made their own fine additions. The O'Haras enjoyed many years in the home and sold the property to Paul and Barbara Bunning



Stevens. The current residents of the property are Fred and Susan Brunner. They, too, have made excellent additions to the home including a beautiful addition in the rear overlooking the lake and exquisite gardens in the front which showcase Susan's talent with plants. The Brunners have also been instrumental in saving and restoring Miller's Pond to benefit all of Park Hills.
