#### FROM YOUR MAYOR

It continues to be a real pleasure to serve as your mayor. Your council (Skip Fangman, Kathy Zembrodt, Monty O'Hara, Steve Elkins, Greg Claypole and Pam Spoor) and I are working hard to make Park Hills' government fair, friendly and open. We pay very close attention to our budget, listen to and ask for accountability from our department heads and always look for opportunities to make our city function even better for our residents.

We have established reserve funds for our police, fire, public works and administration departments which will be funded with the annual savings achieved by each department. This will give an incentive to department heads to outperform their budget and it will build up savings for future needs such as vehicles, equipment and computers. Also, we are transferring our vehicle fee collection to the Kenton County clerk's office. This will do two good things for our residents. First, it will eliminate a trip to the City Building to buy the tag as residents will be able to purchase tags when renewing their license plate and second, it will eliminate the need for a physical tag. The cost will remain the same.

Our police department is doing an excellent job of protecting our city. The city of Bromley is also quite happy with the service they are receiving through our police contract with them. The proceeds of the contract have enabled us to refit our department with cruisers without incurring debt.

We have made several minor adjustments to our zoning code as we continue to seek ways to make Park Hills a great place to do business. The improvements which will be made on Dixie Highway with the proceeds of a grant ( no match is required) should be another positive step.

In closing, I and council thank you for the opportunity to serve you and will do our best to make good and prudent decisions for our city. Don Catchen

## IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT CITY AUTOMOBILE TAGS

As of July 1, 2013, the Kenton County Clerk began assessing the \$15 vehicle registration fee. If you have already bought your city tag, please inform the County Clerk so that you will not make a double payment. Instead of issuing actual tags, the city will receive a monthly report from the

County Clerk advising the City of who has and who has not paid the vehicle fee. Our city clerk's office will be able to verify that you already paid the fee for the year. If you still have not purchased a 2013 tag from the city, please pay the \$15 fee when you register your vehicle.

Next year, 2014, residents will no longer purchase tags at the Park Hills City Building in February and will not have

to append a tag to your vehicle. The \$15 Vehicle Fee will be paid by residents when they renew their registrations during their birth month. We hope this will be a positive change for our residents that will eliminate a February trip to the clerk's office and the effort of attaching the tags. Now you will only have to make one stop during your birth month to pay your registration and your Vehicle Fee.

#### FROM YOUR TREE BOARD

The City of Park Hills Tree Board completes it's first vear of "Plant-A-Tree in your Lawn" program exceeding the goal of over 20 trees planted in the city. The program was finalized at the beginning of 2013 after Tree Board, Village Green and City Council approvals. The program was launched in May with "Plant -A-Tree" applications being posted on the City of Park Hills website. Applications are due each year in June for Tree Board Review and Approval on a first come first serve basis while funds last. Planting occurs after Tree Day in Park Hills. This year Tree Day was October 5, 2013.

This innovative program allows homeowners in the City of Park Hills to apply for a tree to be planted in their lawn at no cost to the

homeowner. The Tree Board requests the homeowner make a \$100 tax deductible contribution to the city tree fund in return and agreeing to care for the tree. Homeowners have a choice from over 14 trees both large and small which were selected as best for our region. #### YOUR ROADS

We are about to finish our infrastructure work for 2013. The jobs undertaken this year include the Old State/Arlington roads total rebuild, the supporting piers (64 feet) to prevent further land slippage on Hamilton Road and the milling and overlaying of 3 sections of Amsterdam Road from Hillcrest to

Sleepy Hollow Rd. . Improvements were also made to the storm sewer problem in the Coram/ Harriet Streets location.

Our project for 2014 will be the installation of additional storm sewer work and a sidewalk from Cecelia to Dixie Hwy.

The grant money we re-

ceived from the Ky. Dept. of Highways will also be used to improve infrastructure work along Dixie Hwy., install a sidewalk from Covington Catholic (St. Joseph Lane) down to North Arlington and improvements to the business district area with additional lighting and landscape improvements.

I would also like to take this opportunity on behalf of the mayor and city council to thank all the residents of Park Hills for their patience during the construction time.

During the holiday season thefts are on the rise. Here are a few tips to keep everyone safe and secure! Do not leave your car keys in your car (Insurance companies may not cover your loss)

Do not leave your car running unattended (It is illegal to do this and again, if your car is stolen this may not be covered by your insurance)

Lock your vehicles
Remove purses, wallets,
packages and valuable items from your
car

If you must leave valuables in your car please put them out of sight

Turn on outside lights to deter unwanted visitors

If you are going to be



away for a while consider putting timers on the indoor lights

Keep shades closed in the evenings

Notify the police department if you are going away for vacation/business

Do not leave doors and windows unlocked/ unsecure

Burglaries do occur during the day while everyone is away at work.

Be a good neighbor, report any suspicious activities

If you feel something is

suspicious, CALL the police because your feelings are usually correct

Call dispatch anytime you need the police at 859-356-3191, not the department number. There's a good chance the officer is out patrolling.

There's been a rise in smart phone and ipad thefts.
This includes subjects grabbing the phones from people while they're talking. Although this has mainly occurred in larger metropolitan areas everyone should be aware that these thefts happen. The theory behind it is that even though your phone has built-in

security that will turn the phone off if stolen, that phone can be sold on the internet and shipped overseas where the security is easily by-passed.

Depending on the phone, thieves are getting upwards to \$700+ per phone. Evidently IPhones are the big commodity.

If you are in a car accident and you are able, please move your car off of the roadway. Leaving your cars on the roadway after an accident places yourself and others in danger of contributing to another accident.

Remember to **CALL THE PO- LICE** if you observe suspicious behavior.

#### FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS



The Members of the Park Hills Fire Department have been hastily preparing the firehouse and all of the essential equipment for winter weather. As we complete our seasonal duties, I would like to remind all of our residents to prepare their homes for winter and review some important safety precautions. The following is a short list of tips to get ahead of the winter freeze:

- \*Have your furnace, fireplace, or wood burning stove inspected and maintained.
- \*Have vents checked for proper operation and chimney flue's inspected for creosote.
- Use ember screens or doors to keeps sparks from fireplaces inside the firebox.
- Dispose of all fireplace ashes in a metal container outside and away from the house.
- Never leave space heaters unattended, or plugged in using extension cords.
- Test your CO and Smoke Alarms- Change batteries and replace units over 5yrs old.
- Keep children and all combustibles at least 3 FEET AWAY from any heating device.

Following these simple tips will assure that you and your family will be well prepared for the upcoming frigid temperatures and rising thermostats.

We cannot mention upcoming winter weather without also reminding you of Safety for the Holidays! **Thanksgiving**- is the leading day of the year for home fires involving cooking equipment. Please use caution when preparing your turkey, don't leave it unattended. The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) is also discouraging the use of any fryers that immerse in hot oil.

The winter holiday season should be a joyous time of year. However, certain types of fires and injuries associated with holiday decorating are much more common during this season.

Use caution when displaying a live Christmas tree- Between 2006-2010, U.S. fire departments responded


- to an average of 230 home fires that started with Christmas trees per year. These fires caused an average of 4 deaths, 21 injuries, and \$17.3 million in direct property damage annually.
- \*A heat source too close to the Christmas tree started one of every five (18%) of these fires.
- Use all decorative lighting per the manufacturer recommendations- Holiday lights and other decorative lighting with line voltage were involved in an estimated average of 160 home structure fires per year in this same period. These fires caused an average of nine civilian deaths, 13 civilian injuries, and \$9.0 million in direct property damage per year. Seventeen percent of these fires began with Christmas trees. Electrical failures or malfunctions were factors in two-thirds (69%) of the fires involving holiday or decorative lights. When extension cords are necessary, use short heavy duty cords rated for either indoor or outdoor displays. For multiple plugs, a rated power strip with circuit breaker is the safest choice. Avoid overloading standard wall outlets.
- **Never** leave any type of candles unattended or too close to combustibles. The top three days for home candle fires were Christmas, New Year's Day, and Christmas Eve.
- More than half (56%) of the home candle fires occurred when some form of combustible material was too close to the candle. Keep candles at least 12 inches from anything that can burn. Unattended equipment or abandoned materials or products were contributing factors in one of every five (19%) home candle fires. Never leave a burning candle unattended. Blow out candles when you leave a room.

#### BRIDGE TOLL AND REPLACEMENT UPDATE

I do not know how many who read this newsletter know me. While I am presently the Vice Mayor of Covington; I was born and raised in Park Hills on Audubon Road and have very fond memories of those years. I am writing to raise awareness of a problem that is facing not only Covington and Park Hills; but also our neighboring communities. That problem we are facing is the expansion of the Brent Spence Bridge and the high probability of having it tolled if we do not all stick together. I have been the most vocal, high visibility point person for advocating a no toll position on the Bridge. I leave it to each person to judge the merits of my position. What is not in dispute by even the supporters of the Build Our Bridge Now coalition are the following facts. Base your own opinion on this: The Kentucky and Ohio Departments of Transportation project that traffic will drop on the Brent Spence Bridge from 194,000 crossings per day to 117,000 if the toll is \$2, the most likely projected toll level. That means 77,000 cars will be finding their way across other bridges with devastating impacts to Covington's economic viability. While maybe that is not of immediate concern to you; were Covington to fail, trouble will flow out Dixie Highway. Further, a lot of that traffic will clog and create additional wear and tear on Amsterdam Road and Dixie Highway. Projections are that traffic will more than double on the Clay Wade Bailey and Suspension Bridges as people descend into Covington to avoid a toll. Expect back routes such as these and Route 8 through Ludlow to be constantly bottlenecked. What is even more disturbing for residents of Park Hills and Kenton Hills along with those who enjoy Devou Park is that Lewis Street near St. John's Church will be cut off from traffic because of how wide the new Bridge is. There is a proposal to widen Montague to two ways where a number of houses would be taken; but the project managers do not include funding for this in their plan, considering it outside the scope of the Brent Spence Bridge Project. Frankly, Covington doesn't have the money to pay for widening Montague and the Project doesn't seem to want to help much with Covington's other traffic diversion issues. If that isn't enough, Park Hills will lose a whole neighborhood perched on Scenic Drive and Cedar Ridge Lane due the widening of the "Cut in the Hill". What I am asking you to do is to get involved. Covington is asking for a delay in implementing any legislation that might enable the Brent Spence Bridge Project to go forward in the upcoming 2014 Kentucky General Assembly. If we can delay this for another year, it is far more likely that we can win concessions and alter the worst parts of the design. I know three years ago I organized the resistance and we got Covington's Fourth and Fifth Street exits which the original design eliminated put back in the project. Write to your State Legislators, both of whom support me in this. They need evidence of your opinion to show down state. Your State Senator is Chris McDaniel who is predisposed to help us. His email is chris.mcdaniel@lrc.kv.gov Your State Representative is Arnold Simpson who is foursquarely in my corner. His email is: Arnold.Simpson@lrc.ky.gov Additionally you may wish to copy or write separately the head of the Northern Kentucky Caucus of State Legislators, Adam Koenig whose email is Adam.Koenig@lrc.ky.gov Finally you may wish to copy our most Senior State Legislator from this Region who actually may have the power to stop this, State Senate Floor Majority Leader Damon Thayer whose email is: Damon.Thayer@lrc.ky.gov Steve Frank CFP Mayor pro Tempore, Covington Kentucky PS: I believe I have stopped the expansion of the "Event Center" at Devou Park Golf Course. Hopefully now the Park Board will go back to designing a simple new clubhouse.

# WINTER WEATHER ISSUES NO PARKING DURING DECLARED SNOW EMERGENCY

Please be advised, there is no parking allowed on city streets

during a declared snow emergency. A snow emergency will be announced on all local television channels and radio stations. The city's Public Works Director, or police officer in charge at the time, shall determine if falling snow, sleet and/or freezing rain requires that parking be restricted in order to plow and clean the streets. A snow accumulation of three (3) inches or more will also constitute a snow emergency. It is important to keep the streets clear of vehicles so that the snow plow has room to pass streets safely and do an effective job. As many of you know, parking in the city is limited so having a plan



in place beforehand will help to cut down on road clearing delays. The police department is required to enforce the snow emergency ordinance and if your vehicle is parked on the street during a snow emergency, it will be ticketed or towed.

If you observe power lines down, trees on power lines or heavy ice and snow weighing down the lines or trees, do not attempt to remedy the situation on your own. Call the city or the fire department for assistance.
